

COUNCIL MEETING OF JUNE 20, 2016

The second regular June meeting of the Mannington City Council with Mayor James Taylor presiding was held Monday, June 20, 2016 at 7:00 p.m. at city hall. Council members attending were Denny Efaw, Kenneth Fletcher, Charlie Kolb, Richard Stevens and Becky Williams.

City Clerk Michele Fluharty read the minutes of the previous meeting and they stood approved as read.

Lucas Price asked about moving the speed bump by his house on Meadow Avenue. Mayor Taylor said he would look into it.

Reese Cup Bates thanked the City for paving Tannery Drive.

Chief of Police David James said he would like an executive session later in the meeting.

In New Business, Fluharty reported that the City's contract with Citynet does not expire until May 2017 and in order to get out of the contract, the City must pay the monthly bill for the remaining months. Fluharty said that would amount to approximately \$5000. Council said they did not want to spend that much to get out of the contract but suggested that Frontier be contacted to see if they would help the City pay the exit fees.

The last item on the agenda was the outstanding bills. Efaw made the motion to pay the bills as presented. Stevens seconded the motion and it carried.

Code Enforcement Officer Anthony Horton gave his May and June report. He said he issued 18 building permits, 12 violation notices, had two hearings and issued a notice to Mannington Manor to replace sixteen of their decks.

Taylor asked for an executive session to discuss personnel. Kolb made the motion to adjourn into executive session. Efaw seconded the motion and it carried. The time was 7:15 p.m.

The regular meeting reconvened at 7:20 p.m.

Taylor said he is still looking for the additional \$50,000 needed to demolish the old Wintergarden property. The WV Housing Development was mentioned as a possible source.

Stevens made the motion to adjourn. Efaw seconded the motion and it carried. The meeting adjourned at 7:30 p.m.
